As you embark on the next chapter of your journey, whether it be further education, entering the workforce, or pursuing your responsibilities or passions in other realms, may the











































DAILY RECAPS

I have always loved talking about my dreams. As a child, when I had to make up love stories between the squares in the carpet to coax myself into slumber, my dreams were always so long and intricate that I never seemed to have the right words to describe them but I would always find a willing listener, my mum or my dad, to hear me out.

When I came to NYU Abu Dhabi, I would often start my mornings with Bisha at D2 recounting the storyline of last night's dream, looking at her expressions change as the nonsense I was spewing finally jolted her awake. In these daily recaps, I began relying on words in Bosnian, Arabic, or Urdu to convey ideas that simply wouldn't fit into English.





### NO MATTER WHERE WE GO, WE'LL ALWAYS HAVE THE WORDS, AND EACH OTHER.

It's not that English isn't an incredible language. it bridges three continents in my friend group alone, but it is a language which lacks personality. I can say "I love you," in English without capturing even a fraction of the emotion I feel when I summon the courage to say "volim te." in Bosnian. In our group of seven languages, we have all become accustomed to weaving each other's phrases into everyday conversation without even noticing. There's a depth of emotion Bosnian conveys, the love carried in Arabic, and the jokes that only sound right in Urdu. It is for these reasons that the narrative of my dreams each one of my friends is used to hearing is adorned with the words and phrases they have taught me during my four years at NYUAD.

During those rare times all eight of us managed to gather, our conversations were always loud. I remember walking over to get my food in D1 and realizing I could easily hear our conversation despite the blaring music and being nearly twenty meters away. No matter how loud or embarrassing, the conversations were always a mix of our native languages woven with English, punctuated by questions from anyone who couldn't quite catch every word or phrase being tossed around.

Although I might not be daydreaming about carpet squares anymore, the practice of retelling my dreams has taught me to speak in ways I knew not of before. It allowed me to speak of my first love in seven languages, each one capturing the hope I carried. And even though that love remained just a dream, what remained reality is our patchwork of languages that continues to connect us. We've built something lasting, an unwritten dictionary of inside jokes, gentle teases, and quiet comfort. No matter where we go, we'll always have the words, and each other.

I AM FROM ABU DHABI






SKETCHING MY JOURNEY

August 22, 2023 — my first day at NYU Abu Dhabi. Stepping onto campus in the sweltering summer heat, I felt a mix of excitement and uncertainty. My mind swirled with questions: after years of working, was returning to school the right choice? What would life in Abu Dhabi be like? Could this place become my new home? I had no answers.

But from the very first week, NYUAD gave me no time for doubt. Each day was filled with new experiences, learnings, and discoveries. As an artist, I wanted to capture these moments, so I began to draw my life at NYUAD.

I drew my first meal with professors and classmates, the insights from class discussions, the beautiful performances at the Red Theater, the inspiring lectures at the Conference Center, and focused hours in my studio. I sketched morning walks where I met students from all over the world, the excitement of school trips to art exhibitions in Dubai and Sharjah, the joy of yoga and belly dancing classes, and the birds chirping outside my dorm window.



At first, these sketches were just personal reflections. But everything changed when I showed them to my professors, classmates, and visitors at MFA Studio Open Day. To my surprise, they were curious and fascinated, not only by the paintings, but also by the stories behind. Their encouragement inspired me to share my journey more widely.

So I kept painting, not only campus life but also my travels across the UAE and the Middle East. By the end of my first year, my visual diaries had grown into something bigger. Inspired by Bedouin traditions, I created a tent with my diaristic paintings, inviting people to sit inside, flip through my visual diaries, and contribute their own. Later, through the MFA program, I exhibited this tent at Abu Dhabi Art, where I shared my stories with a wider audience, and encouraged them to draw their stories.

I took my NYUAD life stories to more places. At COP28 in Dubai, I presented how my experience planting mangroves with the NYUAD communities had inspired me to create artworks exploring climate and sustainability. At the China-Gulf Forum in Abu Dhabi, I shared my personal discoveries about art and culture in the Gulf and how I use art for cross-cultural communications.

Now, as I prepare for my graduation exhibition at 421 gallery, I look back at these two years and see how each drawing, each experience, has shaped me. What began as a simple diary has become a journey full of discoveries, connections and stories. Even after I leave NYUAD, I will carry this spirit forward — continue exploring, creating, and capturing new stories.










When asked about my time at NYU Abu Dhabi, my favorite answer is: everything has changed, and yet nothing at all! I arrived eager to explore and transform, not realizing that the most profound journey would be my journey inward. The best advice I have received along the way was, "Do not be afraid to explore, and it's okay if where you land is where you started."

My journey across countries and communities has complemented my inward exploration. In moments of quiet reflection - a phone-free weekend in the desert on *Belonging for Spiritual Seekers*, during a J-Term in Nepal titled *Being Here* - I wrestled with the big questions about who I am and why we are here. Yet I often found reflective moments in campus life, through D2 meals, and conversations over chai.


A highlight of my time has been within the student support group, REACH. REACH has evolved with the needs of our community, and is a space for belonging and care. Like fractals, our individual stories weave into something greater.

Beyond NYUAD, I carry these questions with me — not to seek answers, but to hold them with curiosity and care. Growth can also be a return to what we knew all along, but with deeper understanding. The outward journey continues, unfolding in ways yet to be imagined.

TRIP TO BRUXELLES



Thirty-four countries in four years, yet Zimbabwe stands apart. Luka, Abhinav, Vaishali, Shanzae, and I set off, *Still Into You* by Paramore on repeat. What we did not know was how this trip would test all of us like no other NYU Abu Dhabi final exam would.

On day two, Shanzae received an urgent call, and with 20 minutes to spare, we fought airline staff to get her on a flight home. Hours later, Luka and I realized our passports and local cash were missing, left under a hotel mattress from the night before. A frantic drive back ended with us running out of gas, leaving Abhinav as collateral at a station that only took cash. By 2am, we found him waiting, unfazed. Zimbabwe started testing us, but NYUAD had trained us well — think fast, adapt, and rely on your people.

Why pay for a driver, safari jeep, and tour guide when we could drive our own X-Trail 2014 through Zimbabwe's largest safari park? Four very independent seniors took on the challenge. "Do not get out of the car at any cost," the guards warned. But when elephants crossed our path, we decided that rules are meant to be broken — polaroids were taken,

and consequences ignored. As the hours dragged on, we ran out of water, snacks, and patience. My hands bled from steering through the bumps. But we had seen this before — wandering through alleyways in Tokyo, sprinting to class in New York, and chasing the last tube in London. NYUAD's global experiences have taught us how to survive anywhere. When we finally reached a guard post, a woman handed us water and Coca-Cola. It was the best Coke I've ever had, I swear.

Once wasn't enough - we did it all again in two more parks. We stood before Victoria Falls, the world's largest sheet of falling water. We woke at 5am to watch the sunrise over Matobo Hills. We found vegetarian food for Abhi and Vaishali in places we didn't think possible. We sang our lungs out on a karaoke night, jumped into a freezing pool, took roads locals told us to avoid, handed out snacks at a local school, and parked by a random lake just to breathe. We ran out of gas (again), with no station nearby, and had to buy fuel from a random man on the side of the road.

This trip wasn't just a road trip, it was everything NYUAD had prepared us for.
The independence, the problem-solving, the trust in each other. Zimbabwe threw challenges our way, but the real lesson was knowing, deep down, that we would always find our way back - together.
